What goes around, comes around: Cases that keep me going Laura Alexis Janda

I am fascinated by the treasure trove of meanings tucked away in the grammatical morphemes that many people think of as mere functional fillers. As a student, the Slavic case endings on nouns baffled me, then later delighted me with their complex stories about trajectories, time, benefit and harm, labels, and so much more.
